TESTING AN ARTESIAN WELL. Mr. A. Jaeger tested the artesian well at his residence on the 24th. It was dug in September 1881, and the water flowed 14 ft. 6 in. above the level of the ground. During 1882 and 1883 the water fell to 12 ft. 6 in. remaining at that height with slight fluctuations until the present time. Mr. Jaeger put a 2 in. valve 8 ft. 5 in. from the ground, and when he opened it, the water stood all ft. 4 in.

ATHLETIC SPORTS.

A SERIES OF INTERESTING EVENTS AT RAPIOLANI PARK.

Favored with fine weather the Oahu Athletic College Association held its first meeting at Kapiolani Park on Saturday afternoon. Four special teams left town shortly after noon loaded with passengers, while a large number of people drove out in private carriages. The grand stand was pretty well filled with spectators.

The officials were: Judges, Mr. H. M. Whitney Jr., Prof. W. T. Brigham and Mr. Wanzey; Starter, Mr. H. W. Peck; Scorer, W. J. Forbes; Clerk of the Course, Rev. W. C. Merritt. The programme contained no less than twenty-two events, all of which were contested with the exception of the half mile race. Following is a summary of the sport:

1. 220 yds dash: F. Haley 1st, H. Lyman 2d, E. E. Lyman 3rd; won by three yards. Time, 28 seconds.

2. Running long jump: C. Ostrom, 16ft 3in 1st; C. Conradt, 15ft 10in 2d; R. A. Lyman Jr., 15ft 5in 3d; C. Dole, 15ft 2in; F. Haley 15 ft. Lightweights, Geo. Angus 14ft, H. Rycroft 13ft 4in.

3. Putting 12lb. shot: R. A. Lyman Jr., 34ft 2in 1st; A. Sinclair, 29ft 7in 2d; C. Conradt, 28ft 1in 3rd; E. E. Lyman, 27ft 4in; W. Armstrong, 26ft 4in; W. Chamberlain, 25ft 3in; F. Haley, 25ft 1in; F. Eaton, 25ft; F. Armstrong, 24ft 2in. Lightweights: G. Angus, 23ft 5in; W. Cornwell, 20ft 5in; J. Judd, 18ft 8in.

4. Three-legged race: W. Cornwell and H. Rycroft 1st; G. Angus and H. Bicknell 2d; C. Dole and S. Widdfield 3rd; C. Ostrom and W. Armstrong fell, and did not finish. Cornwell and Rycroft held the lead all the way, winning by two yards.

5. Running high jump: R. A. Lyman Jr., 4ft 7in, 1st; C. Ostrom, 3ft 2in 2d; C. Dole, 4ft 1 in; A. Sinclair, 4ft 1 in. Five others competed.

6. Throwing 16lb hammer: A. Sinclair 41ft 2in, 1st; R. A. Lyman Jr., 34ft 5in, 2d; W. Chamberlain, 30ft 7in, 3rd. Two others competed.

7. One mile walk: H. Lyman 1st, S. Widdfield 2d, A. Perry 3rd. Eight others started. When the pistol was fired, A. D. Bissell took the lead and was soon several yards ahead. After going a quarter of a mile H. Lyman passed Bissell, the rest struggling along some distance behind. Up the home stretch Bissell looked like a winner, but about 120 yards from the tape he fell to the ground in a faint, leaving Lyman to win easily. Time, 8 min. 14-5 sec.

8. Standing high jump: A. Sinclair 3ft 11in 1st; R. A. Lyman 3ft 10 in, 2d. Two others competed.

9. Kicking football: C. Conradt, 148ft 4 in, 1st. Four other competitors.

10. Throwing baseball: A. D. Bissell 260ft 6in, 1st. Nine competitors.

11. Quarter mile dash: W. Armstrong 1st, H. Lyman 2d, W. Chamberlain 3rd. Five others ran. A very good race, Armstrong winning by two yards. Time 65 sec.

12. Bicycle race, one mile: W. Cornwell 1st, Carl Maertens 2d, W. Whitney 3d. Cornwell went off with the lead and maintained it until about a quarter of a mile from the tape, when Maertens closed up, and the two came up the stretch dead level. When fifty yards from the tape Maertens' hat fell over his face and caused his bicycle to collide with Cornwell's, both riders being thrown to the ground. Cornwell quickly remounted and passed the tape a winner in 6min. 23sec.

13. One hundred yards dash: A. Sinclair 1st, H. Chamberlain 2d, C. Conradt 3rd. Three others competed. Won after a close race, by a yard. Time 11 1/2 sec.

14. Sack race, 50 yds: C. Conradt 1st, F. Armstrong fell.

MAUI NOTES.

The weather continues unusually dry, and the strong winds that prevail at this season are rapidly drying up vegetation, while blinding clouds of dust add to one's discomfort. "The oldest inhabitant" (that phenomenal person) never saw such a dry winter before, and the wise ones predict an equally dry summer.

The monthly socials, or literaries that have been so popular in this district are things of the past, in their place are to be monthly entertainments (musical and literary) gotten up by the ladies of the district who have formed themselves into a society for that purpose. 20. Half-mile run: Declared off.

21. Keg contest: Won by F. Haley. This consisted of kicking a small keg upward, against the fence by the heels. Quite a number tried it, including Mr. T. G. Gribble, with the result that the keg went up and Gribble went down. This feat was loudly applauded. The representative of the "P. C. A." also tried it with a more favorable result. He was more at home with the "keg" than his predecessor.

22. Pole vault: F. Haley 8ft 6in, 1st; C. Ostrom 7ft 9in, 2d; W. Cornwell 7ft 6in. This was a very interesting competition.

REPLENISHING THE RESERVOIR.

On Saturday last the idea of supplying the Makiki Reservoir with water from the Artesian wells was put to a successful test. The Artesian well at the corner of Kapiolani and Beretania streets was selected for the purpose. On either side of the well hydrants had been put down connecting with the well, the one being attached to the suction hose of the Steam Engine, and the other connected with the engine and the main as a receiver of the water, by means of two, 2 1/2 inch lengths of hose 51 feet in length. From 7:10 p. m. to 5 a. m., making proper allowances for obstructions, and changing of pipes, 84,737 gallons of water had been forced through the 6 inch main along Kapiolani street to the Reservoir, and through the 8 inch main, along Beretania street to Makiki, to the Reservoir, these mains running the length of 7300 feet, and having a gradual elevation of 134 feet. At 5 p. m. the 8 inch gate was opened upon the city, to Judd, Liliha and Lunalilo streets.

During the time occupied in the work the total known quantity—the quantity of water in the pipes being unobtainable—of water pumped into the Makiki Reservoir was 123,202 gallons, raising the water about fifteen inches. During the process of pumping the highest pressure on the water gauge was 72 lbs. and on the steam gauge 85 lbs.

These are gratifying results, and show an anxious desire on the part of the Minister of the Interior to avoid possible water trouble and also show a practical answer to the query, can sufficient water be had to supply the city's demands in the event of a continued drought.
