The German Government has finally decided not to accept Herr Dove's so-called bullet-proof cuirass for use in the German army. At a recent trial of its efficacy at Spandau the cuirass was pierced by bullets from a regulation rifle at 600 metres—about 2000 feet.

James A. King, Minister of the Interior, has an advertisement in the San Francisco Chronicle for water pipe and pumping plant, specifications to be seen at the office of Superintendent of Public Works in Honolulu, and at the offices of the Consuls-General in San Francisco and New York. Anyone passing by the Executive building grounds during the evening will notice more than the usual number of guards, standing within ten or twenty paces of each other. It has been ascertained that the authorities have doubled the night-guards since the departure of the U. S. S. Philadelphia, as a precaution against any possible uprising.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Emma Napoleon, mother of Mrs. S. Mahelona, Mrs. J. U. Kawainui, Mrs. E. P. Low, Maikai Napoleon, Walter Napoleon and others, who died on Sunday morning, took place yesterday afternoon from the family residence, Queen street. The services were held at Kawaiahae Church, and among those present were President and Mrs. Dole. There was a large attendance of mourners. The interment was in the family plot in the churchyard.

Watches Stolen. There have been several thieving cases reported during the past few weeks. One of these was from the barkentine S. N. Castle, when a gold watch was stolen from the fore-castle. The watch was the property of a sailor. Some time last night Captain Underwood, mate on the same vessel, missed his watch, and search as he might the "ticker" could not be found. The mate, however, suspects who has committed the theft, and the police have been notified. The suspect was on the vessel during yesterday and was seen to be hanging around the mate's room.

JUDICIAL NOTES.

Term Business Progressing—Various Matters at Chambers. Arthur White's trial for assault with a dangerous weapon was postponed on account of illness of defendant. Git Wa, pleading guilty to selling opium, was sentenced to one month at hard labor and to pay \$500 fine. Tanaka Sango, pleading guilty to assault with weapon, got 18 months with \$1 fine, no costs. Youamura, pleading guilty to assault with weapon, was given two years on the reef and fined \$5. Moriama, pleading guilty to assault with weapon, got one year, \$1 fine and no costs. A Featherstone being arraigned yesterday for murderous assault pleaded not guilty. Louisa Rodriguez vs. Domingos Gomes, covenant, is on trial. Carter & Carter for plaintiff, C. W. Ashford for defendant. The following is the jury: Geo. Gran, J. C. Clancy, S. B. Ross, C. M. V. Foster, W. H. Wilkinson, J. McLean, W. W. Hall, J. A. Lyle, W. C. Wilder, J. T. Waterhouse, Jr., W. C. King and J. V. Simonsen. Hong Fook by his attorney, W. C. Achi, moves for a new trial for selling opium, on the ground of newly discovered evidence. Frances E. Jackson petitions to be appointed administratrix of the estate of her husband, J. W. Ashford for defendant. Petitioner is sister-in-law to deceased. The estate is valued at \$1000 and the sole heir known is petitioner. She urges that some person be appointed at once, as small effects are being taken away by persons not authorized. W. R. Castle for petitioner. William C. Achi is suing Isabella A. Achi for divorce on various grounds, beginning with attendance at hula kuis. Jas. B. Castle, Collector General of Customs, has libeled 200 casks shoyu and sundry other merchandise landed from the S. S. Gaelic on May 15. J. M. Monarrat petitions to perpetuate testimony in the matter of his title to land at Kalia, Waikiki.

COFFEE LAND TO SELL. Chance for People to Raise Coffee Close to Honolulu. The principal owners of the Hui land of Kapiulanihine at Manoa intend to ask the Court to partition their interests, and will then offer the land for sale in suitable tracts for coffee planting. Some of the oldest coffee trees on this island are growing in the gulches of this land, and never fail to produce good crops of fine berries. The trees have also thus far been free from any blight or disease. Parties residing in Honolulu desirous of engaging in coffee planting may, by acquiring part of this land, do so without absencing themselves from home.

GETTING BIRDS AND BUGS.

Visit of an Enthusiastic Naturalist from Boston. J. C. Flood, taxidermist, has returned from Molokai, where he spent a week in hunting deer, of which he got one. He did not take any birds there because they were moulting. Mr. Flood has a large naturalist establishment of his own in Boston. He has made a good collection here of birds, beetles, bugs, and eggs. James McGuire of this city assists him in his labors. It is Mr. Flood's eager desire to get possession of skulls deposited in Molokai caves. From here he goes to the Colonies, being on a seven years' trip, and will visit the various groups of Polynesia. He has collected a good many specimens of birds in and about Honolulu. A discovery he has made for himself is that there are two species of mud-hens here, one about the Honolulu marshes and another at C. A. Brown's place, Waipio, Ewa.

Stolen Goods Recovered. A man named J. Duane was on trial in the District Court to-day for receiving and concealing stolen goods, the property of G. P. Denison.
