TEMPERANCE LECTURE IN PICTURE

No stronger appeal to be temperate could be found in the words of any lecturer than the picture entitled "Drink" that will be exhibited to the public at the Empire for the first time tomorrow night. The picture was run off yesterday for the members of the press. The story deals with the life of the French artisan and was written by Emil Zola. The dramatization of the moving picture people is a most complete one, the scenes shown being true to Paris life. The plot of the story is built about the life of a young French woman who is deserted by her husband, and who later marries the man who protected her when alone in the world. Through the manipulation of a woman enemy of the wife the second husband falls a victim to drink. Among the scenes in the play is one of a French washhouse, where two of the women characters fight a duel with buckets and pieces of laundry. The enemy of the wife is persistent in her attempt to ruin the other woman and goes to such lengths that she places a footfall on a building on which the husband is working so he falls and is severely injured. Perhaps the strongest scene in the play is that of the leading character in the last act when his life is ended during delirium tremens. The man's release from a hospital is shown. As he leaves a doctor gives him a warning that should be drunk strong liquor he will be certain to die, but permits him to use old red wine. The woman enemy of the family substitutes a bottle of liquor for the bottle of red wine he brings home with him. After one taste of the liquor his thirst is too much for his will power and he continues to drink, stopping only to glance at the written warning of the physician. Eventually he falls on the floor in a stupor, with imagined reptiles and dies. The acting throughout the play is only such that the French amateurs of the spoken word is not necessary to drive home the sermon of this story "Drink."

JURY DECIDES AGAINST MAGOON

The jury in Judge Whitney's court yesterday decided that J. A. Magoon must pay \$256.97 to Henry Van Gleson. The trial has lasted for several days and grew out of the fact that Magoon failed to fulfill a contract entered into between himself and Van Gleson. The contract was that for a certain consideration Magoon was to carry a case from one court to another till it had reached the highest. In this respect it is claimed that Magoon did not make good, and Van Gleson took the case himself to the highest court and the expense of doing so was the amount prayed for and granted by the jury.

CHILDREN WILL HAVE PLAYGROUNDS

In the social hall of the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon, the following-named gentlemen were elected members of the executive committee of the Civic Federation: P. M. Pond, J. W. Gilmore, W. A. Bryan, Edgar Wood, A. F. Cooke, Both W. R. Castle and Ed. Towse were offered re-nomination, but owing to pressure of business declined the honor. P. M. Pond and J. W. Gilmore were elected to fill these two vacancies.

D. L. Withington, chairman of the committee on legislative and public service, read a very interesting report, in which he stated that the committee believed all the counties, with the exception of Hawaii, were being administered as honestly as could be expected.

The committee on parks, streets and public works outlined a system of playgrounds for the children in those districts which at present are so crowded that the children are forced to play in the streets. The first of these was the lot at the corner of Nuanuu and Beretania, formerly the property of Queen Emma. Most of the trees have been cut down and all the flower beds are buried under piles of lumber belonging to some Japanese contractors.

The committee recommends the purchase of this place so as to convert it into a playground fitted with necessary paraphernalia for the amusement of the children. Another natural park that could easily be converted into a playground would be the lot situated between School and Kuakini streets, on the Nuanuu stream. The committee recommended that this be purchased, and as it would require very little additional expense to put it into good shape, they considered it a very desirable location.

The suggestion made by Judge Dole some time back, to convert a portion of Thomas Square, into an athletic field for the McKinley High School, was strongly opposed by the committee. The committee, however, recommended that the waterfront parks at the foot of Nuanuu street should be beautified by planting banyan trees. Other spots were named in connection with a chain of playgrounds for the children of this city, one being on the Pauoa stream and another in Kakaako.

FORT DE RUSSY ITEMS

On account of lack of ward room in the post hospital here, the following members of Company G, 2nd Battalion of Engineers, have been transferred to the post hospital at Fort Shafter for further treatment: Private Ara Pinch, Private Frederick Hummel, Private Plank, Private Reinhart and Private Holt. The remaining men in the post hospital here are members of the survey detachments and will remain at this post until well enough to return to their camps. Private Messberry of the Waimanalo detachment was sent to the post hospital today from his detachment to receive treatment.

Promotion.

Second Class Private Andrew Brokke of Company G has been promoted to the grade of first-class private. Private Brokke is on detail as post plumber of this camp and on extra duty in the quartermaster department.

To Duty.

Private Farley, Company G, was returned to duty today from the post hospital and will leave for his detachment the last of the present week. Privates Marcus and Ford, both of the survey camps, arrived at this post yesterday and are to be sent to the hospital here. Both of these men have been out on survey details since the arrival of the present engineer troops of this island and require a rest from the work in the mountains.

A meeting was held yesterday of the members of the post library and many changes are to be made in the manner in which the reading matter will be handled. Books and magazines will be allowed to be taken from the library building during the evening hours by members, but will be available for reading at the library during the day. All newspapers are to remain in the reading-room with the exception that the ladies of the post will be allowed to take them to their homes for a limited period.

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The drills Tuesday were under direction of company commanders from seven to eight a. m. and an hour of gymnasium drill for Company G and Company H.

Private Snaer, Company G, 20th Infantry, was admitted to the post hospital Tuesday.

Private Roginson, Company G, 20th Infantry, was released from the Fort Shafter hospital Tuesday after an illness of several weeks. He was operated on for rupture more than a month ago. The operation was successful, and he has now entirely recovered and will take up regular routine duty with Company G.

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
