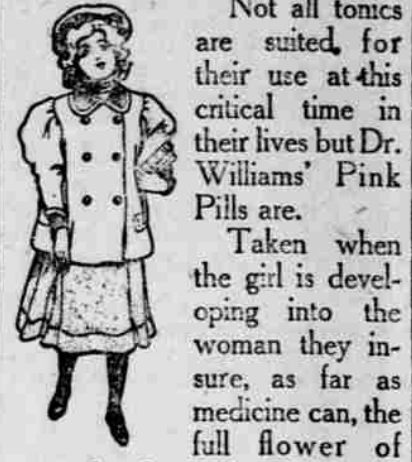

LOCAL BREVITIES.

(From Wednesday's Advertiser.) It is reported that Chairman Hustace of the Board of Supervisors has stated that he is prepared to support A. M. Brown as police court prosecutor if the business interests of the town show that he is wanted in that position.

(From Thursday's Advertiser.) A deed has been recorded from Richard H. Trent, trustee, to Archibald S. Cleghorn, of property on Nuuanu avenue for \$3000. The lease by Hamakua Ditch Co., Ltd., to Honokaa Sugar Co. and others of three reservoirs, ditches, etc., for thirty years at \$3000 a year, is also recorded.

(From Thursday's Advertiser.) A deed has been recorded from Gonsalves & Co., Ltd., to M. B. Fernandez, of a half interest in R. P. 4823, Kapapa, Kaula, interest in merchandise, fixtures, etc., in Kapapa store, and horses, wagons, etc., for \$7000.

Judge S. B. Dole of Honolulu and Judge C. S. Dole of Kapaa have been guests at Kekupa for a few days but have now gone up to Halemanu. A. H. Rice accompanied them mauka in order to join them in the Kalalau expedition.—Garden Island.

Governor Frear has written a letter to Dr. Brackett of San Francisco thanking him for his hospitality to the members of the National Guard team that went to the National marksmanship contest. Dr. Brackett was a visitor in Honolulu and went up on the same steamer as the team.

One of the recently arrived Spanish immigrants called at the Capitol yesterday with an interpreter to inquire about the means to secure government land. He is a stone mason by trade but says that in his youth he was a vineyardist, and he thinks conditions here for viticulture better than anything he knew in Spain.

M. B. Fernandez has deeded a half interest in the Kapapa, Kaula, store property which he bought for \$7000 from Gonsalves & Co., to the Bank of Hawaii, Ltd., for \$3000.

Olaa plantation has just finished planting 3369 acres of plant cane for the 1909 crop. This is about 300 acres more than the estimate of a few months ago. The planting season has been favorable.

A report from one of the Hilo coast plantations is to the effect that in the twenty-four hours following Saturday afternoon at 5 p. m., 19.93 inches of rain fell, and in the next twelve hours 11.65 inches, making a total of 31.58 inches of rain in thirty-six hours. The differences between the heads of county departments and Tax Collector Holt on the matter of collecting taxes from county employes has been composed by instructions to the heads of departments to require their employes to pay their taxes. Where employes, as in the road and some other departments, are receiving only small wages, the personal taxes will be collected in instalments.

MRS. KEPNER DYING IN COLORADO CITY

The tremendous increase in the pineapple industry is causing the Oahu Railroad people to sit up and take notice. The crop from the Dole property at Wahiawa during the past season has amounted to 95,000 cases of canned pines, all of which have been shipped over the railroad to this city to be handled in the canneries. The main railroad to Wahiawa has handled the traffic up to this time but within the next year or eighteen months it seems certain that branch roads through the pineapple center will have to be built, to enable the more expeditious and better handling of the product.

HILONIAN SAILS.

Castle & Cooke, the agents for the Hilonian of the Matson Navigation Company, received a cable message yesterday notifying them that the liner had left San Francisco at noon, on her regular schedule. She should arrive here next Thursday, between 2 and 3 o'clock in the afternoon. If she follows the usual rule which has been in force with Captain Johnson of late, she should have a full passenger list. For the last three or four trips she has been overbooked each time she sailed.

KRUPPS ARE MAKING BIG GUNS FOR JAPAN

ESSEN, September 8.—The Krupp Works are building for Japan about thirty 12-inch guns for use on board battleships, and they are continuing the fulfillment of a contract, made soon after the war with Russia ended, for reguipping the Japanese field artillery.

Confirmation has been obtained of the statement that Japan placed an order for 12-inch guns with the Krupps only because the British works were filled with orders three years ahead for guns of this calibre. The Japanese before making contracts with the Krupp Works consulted the British government on the subject. Japan is selling her old field artillery to the Chinese viceroys.

The Krupp are sending the guns to Japan in the rough, bored out, but not finished. The guns will be completed and mounted in the Japanese arsenals. The Krupp Works are understood to be making more out of the contract than if the guns were delivered completed. Several Japanese officers are stationed in Germany, but their presence is due to inspection of the field artillery only. Reports that the Krupp Works are engaged on enormous orders for war material placed by Japan recently are incorrect.
