### KILLED FOR WITCHCRAFT.

Atrocious Murder Committed By Igorian Filipinos.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24.—Word has been received here of an atrocious murder in the Philippines at the town of Caplain. It appears from the testimony that two natives were responsible for the death of the wife of a neighbor. They went to the home of a native named Victor Pore and forcibly took him and his wife to the Panay river, where they bound their hands behind them and told them that "their last day had come." The woman was struck by a bolo and her body thrown into the river. Her husband witnessed her murder, and anticipating similar treatment sprang into the river, and notwithstanding his arms were pinioned, managed to reach the opposite side.

According to witnesses, the motive for the crime was a superstitious belief that the woman was possessed of occult powers, whereby she in some mysterious way had brought about the death of a neighbor's child. The two men were sentenced to be hanged, but General MacArthur mitigated the sentence in each case to confinement at hard labor for twenty years, on consideration for the extremely low order of intelligence and blind superstition of the accused.

### Defendant Robinson's Answer.

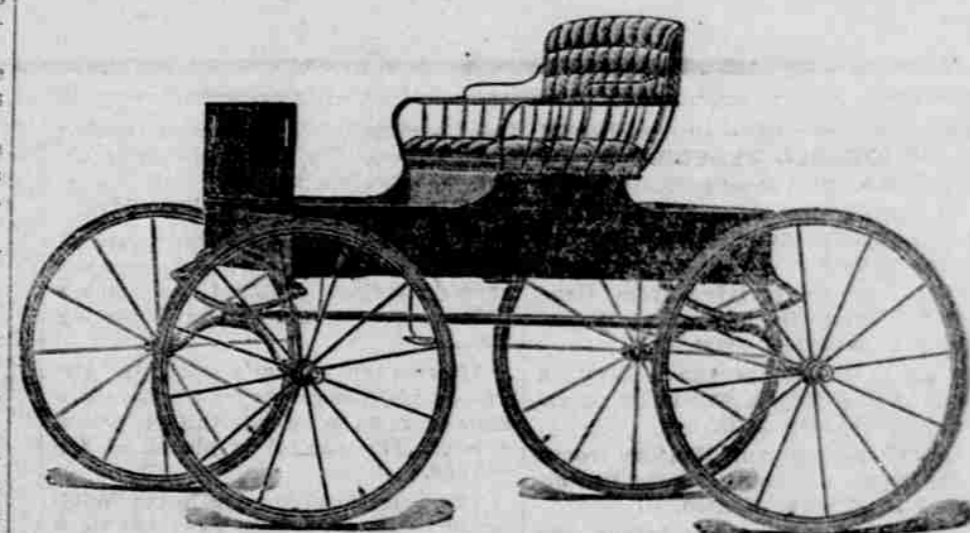

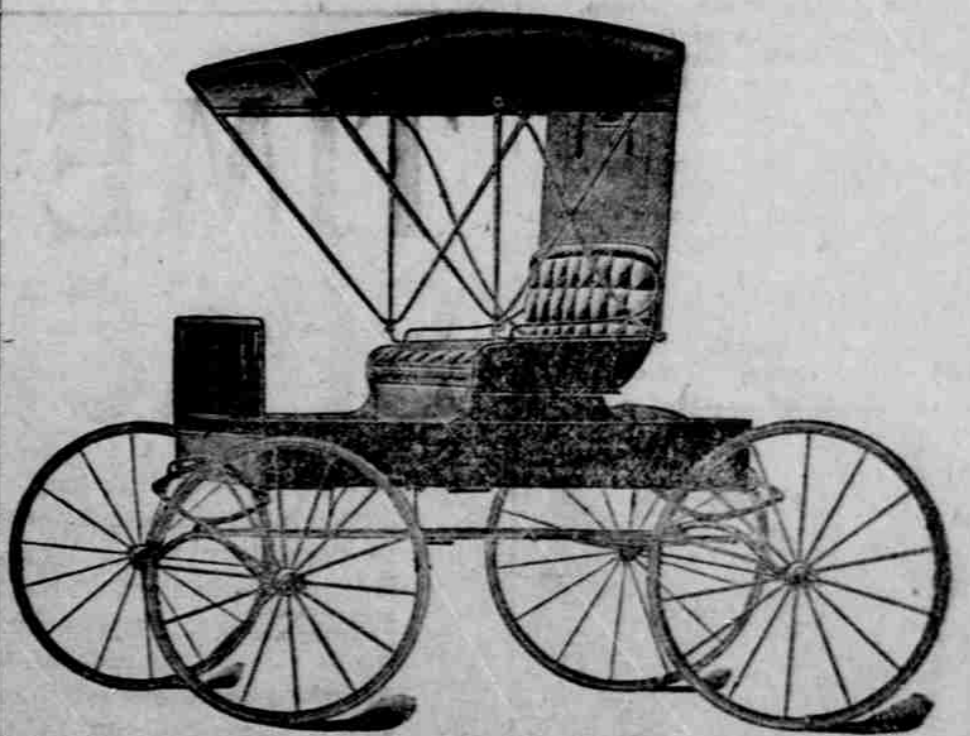
