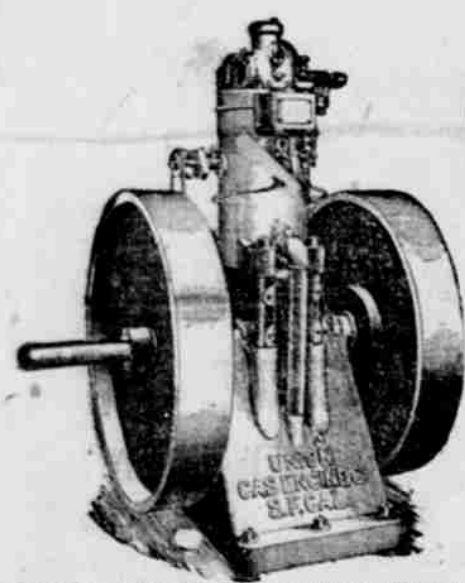

### BONES AND BROKEN COFFIN WERE FOUND IN A CAVE

Two natives while working on the Kalulani tract last Monday discovered a human skeleton in a cave. Near by was a broken coffin, showing that the body had one time been duly buried. The broken coffin gave evidence of vandalism of quite recent date.

The motive for breaking open this lone coffin must have been either avarice or the mere curiosity of vandalism. The body had from all appearances been buried for three or four years and is supposed to have been that of a native. Nothing could be learned of the family or persons who had chosen to lay their dead away in a lonely cave, rather than in the public cemetery. It was an old custom, however, with Hawaiians to bury their dead in this manner, and the discovery serves only to recall a habit now fast growing obsolete.

### PROGRESS OF YOUNG BLOCK.

Subterranean Water Interferes With Work—Pumps Make Headway.

The work of excavating for the foundations of the big Alexander Young building on King street, and the laying of the concrete seems to be a prevailing attraction these days. The work of blasting the massive banks of coral is moving on apace. In this the excavators have in several instances reached such a depth that quite a heavy seepage of water has been tapped, presenting a new obstacle. Two gasoline pumps have been installed and are working day and night to reduce the volume of water. The mixing and moulding of the concrete foundation is being rapidly pushed to completion. The King street side of the wall is now laid, while a greater portion of the Waikiki side of the excavation from King to Hotel street is walled up.

With the noise of exhaust from several fussy little gasoline engines, and the general tumult produced by an army of Oriental as well as white laborers, the scene of building operations presents an animated and interesting picture.

### The Death Roll.

Kale Nahau, Hawaiian, aged 70 years, was found dead at his home near Molopa and Jack's lane Tuesday. At a post mortem examination held yesterday, it was found that death was due to pulmonary tuberculosis. The remains were buried at Makiki.

Mrs. Rose Castino, a native of Honolulu, aged 31 years, died at the home on Beretania street, near the pumping plant from consumption. The remains were interred at Kawaiahae.

**Kaahalamo, an infant, Hawaiian by birth, died of croup yesterday. Interment took place at Kawaiahae.**

Alfred A. Doiron, a native of France, aged 89 years, succumbed to old age yesterday and was buried in the Catholic cemetery.
