 The America Maru arrived here from the Orient yesterday and left for San Francisco this morning.

 At the "Cabinet" meeting yesterday the Attorney-General read an opinion that the Governor cannot grant special franchise. This affects the petitions of the Century Telephone Company and of the Kona-Kau Railroad Company.  
 Charles Hefferman was sent to jail for six years, having been found guilty of forgery. Hefferman was well-known on Maui, in Honolulu and Hilo, and the end of his career was not unexpected to residents of those portions of the Territory.

 The volume of Army criticism continues to grow, and surely no amount of official woodenness will withstand ridicule such as this, for instance, from the pen of Lord Ernest Hamilton, in the "Monthly Review": "When the fighting machinery of the country ceases to compete with the ballets at the Empire and the Alhambra, the Army will also cease to be a refuge for the 'fool of the family.' And when intelligence is recognized and catered to in the Army, and not degraded by a surfeit of trivial routine work, there will be fewer occasions in our campaigns on which to deplore a wanton waste of gallant human lives."

**BILLS; BILLS; BILLS!**

Legislators Have Many Bills Now In Their Sleeves and Soon On the Table or in the Waste Basket.  
 In the House yesterday, notice of intention to introduce bills was given as follows:  
 Dickey—An act to provide for a tax on incomes.  
 Dickey—An act to abolish personal taxes.  
 Robertson—An act to repeal certain obsolete laws.  
 Kaniho—An act to repeal sections 807, 809 of the Civil Code, relating to poll tax, school tax and road tax.  
 Hibio—A bill asking the Congress of the United States to extend the homestead and general land laws of the United States to the Territory of Hawaii.  
 Hibio—A bill to encourage education.  
 Hibio—An act to provide that eight hours shall constitute a legal day's work in the Territory of Hawaii.  
 Hibio—An act to provide that only American citizens of the Territory of Hawaii shall be employed in public work.  
 Makekau—An act to provide for the establishment of municipal and county governments in the Territory of Hawaii.  
 Emmeluth—An act to provide election laws for the Territory of Hawaii, the object being to provide for election of officials and legislators upon a basis of proportional representation.  
 Emmeluth—An act to provide for exemptions from legal executions amending section 1485 of the Civil Code, the object being to provide more liberal exemptions.  
 Kumalae, introduced a joint resolution asking that Congress amend the Territorial Act by striking out in section 44 the following words: "All legislative proceedings shall be conducted in the English language." On motion of Robertson, the resolution was made the order of the day for tomorrow.  
 Kaniho, asked that his bill for repeal of the laws concerning vaccination be taken up. It was passed on reading by title and ordered printed.  
 To Visit Molokai.  
 A consultation was held yesterday afternoon between the committees of the Legislature and the President of the Board of Health in regard to the arrangements necessary for the biennial visit of the Legislature to the Lepor Settlement.  
 It was agreed after much discussion that the list of names submitted by the Legislature committees to the Board of Health for special permits, and a few offered by the Board, should be submitted to President Raymond as coming from the Legislature direct. The joint committee was anxious that the list of outsiders be cut down to the minimum, and some desired that members of the press be the only persons outside the Legislature who should be permitted to go. As finally agreed, the list stands as follows: Senate and House members, 45; Senate and House clerks, 2; stenographers, 2; interpreters, 2; invited by the Legislature, President Raymond of the Board of Health, Wray Taylor, Commissioner of Agriculture and Forestry, W. O. Smith, former president Board of Health; Dr. Charles Engels, one representative each from the Honolulu newspapers—Advertiser, Star, Bulletin, Kuokoa, Independent and Republican.  
 No other persons will be given permission to accompany the junket. President Raymond stated that under no consideration could he go beyond the authority given him, as the chartered steamer belonged to the Legislature.
