Death of Heleluhe.

After a lingering illness Joseph Heleluhe died yesterday morning. The deceased had been a faithful servant of Queen Liliuokalani for many years, and his demise was a sincere grief to Her Majesty and to his many friends, who regret his untimely departure, he being only 45 years of age

He was born in Kau, and since boyhood he served Liliuokalani. He received his education in Hilo from Rev. D. Lyman. In 1895 he was, without any reason, cast into jail with many other political prisoners. and he left the prison, broken in health and strength as many others did. The poisonous atmosphere of the prison underminded his constitu tion and his death has added one more figure to the number of those who virtually were murdered by "the men of '95."

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon from Kawaiahao Church.
