Death of Heleluhu.

After a lingering illness Joseph Heleluhu died yesterday morning. The deceased had been a faithful servant of Queen Liliuokalani for many years, and his demise was a sincere grief to Her Majesty and to his many friends, who regret his untimely departure, he being only 45 years of age.

He was born in Kau, and since boyhood he served Liliuokalani. He received his education in Hilo from Rev. D. Lyman. In 1895 he was, without any reason, cast into jail with many other political prisoners, and he left the prison, broken in health and strength as many others did. The poisonous atmosphere of the prison undermined his constitution and his death has added one more figure to the number of those who virtually were murdered by "the men of '95."

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon from Kawaiahae Church.

Judge Humphreys has filed a certificate in the matter of the estate of Kamila P. Wilhelm, deceased, that the record contains all the papers, pleadings, exhibits and testimony necessary for a proper consideration of the same by the Supreme Court.

Everett and Louis M. Everett of Honolulu and D. H. Everett of San Francisco, all brothers of the deceased. The estate consists of cash in the Spreckels Bank amounting to \$375 and wages due amounting to \$350.

T. S. Kalama was Friday last appointed guardian of Marakieli Kapulupulu Walaaulani, a minor, by Judge Stanley. The estate consists of two pieces of property at Waialeale, Oahu, a share in the Ahupuaa of Waikane, and \$573.45 in the Postal Savings Bank. He has filed his bond for \$1000 with Theo. F. Lansing as surety.

A motion has been filed by defendant in Ernest Hogan vs. Canadian Australian R. M. Steamship Co., Ltd., that it be allowed until the 20th instant in which to file and perfect its bill of exceptions. The motion will be presented to-morrow.

A Total Wreck.

On Dowsett Reef, near Laysan Island, the American bark McNear, Captain Johnson, lies wrecked and a total loss. The accident occurred last May. The news was brought on Saturday by the bark Ceylon, Captain Willer, from Laysan Island. Capt. Johnson and the shipwrecked crew were brought here by the Ceylon, together with three boats of the McNear. It was at night time when the McNear went on the reef. She struck so hard that after the first shock there was never any hope of saving her. Her crew spent thirty-six hours in the boats before reaching Laysan Island. It is said that the heavy current prevailing in the vicinity of Laysan Island were the cause of the wreck.

The McNear went to Laysan from Honolulu in ballast. She went on the reef on the night of May 14th.
