The Maui Circuit court term adjourned sine die at 11 a m Saturday.

The Sierra will be due to arrive tomorrow morning from the Colonies.

The barkentine Irmgard arrived yesterday morning from San Francisco.

The Mailes defeated the All-Maui baseball team on Saturday by a score of 11 to 1.

The America Maru, due to arrive from the Coast tomorrow, will have five days later mail.

The Artillery men were defeated by the Pacifics at baseball yesterday afternoon in Kapiolani park.

Miss Alvena Marshall, of Alakea street, and W M Bray, of the Advertiser, are engaged to be married.

This being her boiler cleaning week, the Likelike will not leave till tomorrow afternoon for Molokai and Maui.

Two steamers will leave for Kauai at 5 o'clock this evening, the Noeau and Niuhau, and also the Kauai for Maui and Hawaii.

The Hawaiian Rifle Club was organized last night with J H Fisher Captain and H E Murray secretary and treasurer.

The Punahous went down to defeat before the Aalas in the second game of baseball at Kapiolani park yesterday.

The Iroquois yesterday took a large party of members of the Pilots and Masters Association to Pearl harbor on a tour of inspection.

There is a rumor on the streets that Governor Carter was before the grand jury today to testify in regard to the changes in the police department.

Francis M Barrazo was arrested at the Volcano House and brought to Honolulu on Saturday to answer to a charge of raising a money order from \$1 to \$12.

The funeral of the late Dr W S Noblitt took place from the late residence in Kalibi yesterday afternoon. The remains, which had been cremated, were buried on the residence grounds.

It is alleged this afternoon that an examination of the books of Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth shows a shortage amounting to considerable. The matter is to be investigated further.

The Republicans held a meeting at the corner of Bethel and Hotel streets Saturday night. There was the usual attendance of street spectators, composed of all parties. The speeches ranged all the way from good to indifferent.

Saturday Night's Meetings.

The Democratic meeting in the Orpheum Saturday evening was very well attended. Nearly all of the seats were occupied and a hundred or more voters were standing. The speeches were all earnest and the audience was enthusiastic all through.

At Asia park there were two big crowds, one of Democrats and one of Home Rulers. The latter, having some music and other attractions, drew the largest crowd.

Comet Discovered.

Engineer Oswald of Pepeekeo Sugar Co reports to the Herald having seen a comet nightly for the past two weeks. He says it is in the direction of North East and about sixty-five to seventy degrees high. It is rather a blurred mass to the naked eye but is distinctly seen by the aid of a glass. He says that it is noticeable from seven to eleven o'clock.—Hawaii Herald.

District Court Doings.

Twenty three cases confronted Judge Lindsay Saturday morning and he disposed of them as is his usual wont. Most of the cases were postponed, viz: Seven Chinese restaurant keepers, from previous date, again went over for a week, and another one to next Monday, and one other nolle prossed. Conrad C von Hamm and Yee Fong, for running lodging houses without licenses, were nolle prossed but were assessed costs of \$2 each. Kahanasupuni (w), for larceny, from the 17th, went over to next Saturday.

Hataichi, for assisting and maintaining a che-fa game, was fined \$100 and costs, and two other Japs, for having che fa tickets in possession, \$25 and costs each. Of assault and battery cases, Harimoto, on Foo Ka, was fined \$5 and costs; Lau Man and Ching Wa Foon, were nolle prossed; Maipuu, on Makaiwi (w), reprimanded and discharged, and Henry Kalili, on Carolina (w), fined \$5 and costs.

Keolanui and Ah Kua, selling liquor without licenses, went over, the former to next Monday and the latter to next Friday. John Piko, for being drunk, from Friday, was found guilty and fined the usual amount.

Not many cases were on this morning's calendar and most of them were postponed to other dates. Ah Chew, for having che fa tickets in possession, and Yee Fong, for running a restaurant without a license, over to tomorrow; Keolanui to Wednesday; Sam Littee, for assault and battery with his fist, to Thursday; Fong Ah Shong and Mrs Chun Hee, both for assault and battery, the latter with a weapon, and Fong Yok, for attempted rape, to Friday.

Sakoda, for heedless driving, was fined \$5 and costs; Manuel P Medeiros, for gambling, fined \$10 and costs, and one Jap for being drunk was assessed \$4 and costs.

Miguel P Lujan, an employee of the Oahu Railway & Land Co, who has been held since last Thursday subject to an investigation, was brought into Court and charged with violating Section 157 of the Penal Laws, by embezzling the sum of \$1000 the property of the said O R & L Co, during three months prior to and including Oct 18th last. Hearing of the same went over to morrow.

Anniversaries of The Dead.

Yesterday was the first anniversary of the death of the late Hon R W Wilcox. Friends and members of the Home Rule party decorated his grave, at the Roman Catholic cemetery, last Saturday afternoon and some yesterday.

It was also the anniversary of the death of Joo M Kapens, father of Mrs Keohokalohe, and one who held various portfolios as a Minister of the Crown during King Kalakaua's reign. His death occurred sixteen years ago yesterday, his wife having preceded him by a year and a half; Their graves in Kawaiahao cemetery were decorated by their only daughter.
