The City Mill Company has brought suit to foreclose a mortgage on the property of Lau Tai and others, rice planters of Hauula, for the recovery of \$8071.39.

The curfew law, which is designed to keep children off the streets between the hours of 9 p m and 4 a m, has gone into effect. It will probably result in delaying the delivery of morning papers.

It is said that Deputy Sheriff Rawlins and Second District Magistrate Judd are both candidates for the vacant office to be caused by the resignation of Judge Gear from the Circuit bench.

CHARLES HAPAI DEAD.

Well Known Young Hawaiian Succumbs at Hilo.

Charlie Hapai, a well known Hawaiian man, died at the residence of his mother on Pitman street early yesterday morning in the twenty-third year of his age. Deceased had been a sufferer from tuberculosis for a long time and was obliged to resign a position here about a year ago on account of ill health. On the advice of his physician he took a sea voyage and visited San Francisco where he remained several months. His health, however, did not improve and the longing for his Hawaiian home became so strong that he suddenly made up his mind to return. When he arrived in Hilo he showed no signs of benefit from the trip and was put in charge of Dr Holland for treatment. The doctor saw there was no hope for his recovery and notified his mother to that effect. For more than two months he has been confined to his bed and constantly growing weaker in spite of the excellent care and attention given him. He was a quiet reserved young man with manners that won for him the respect of everyone with whom he came in contact. During the time he held a position in a local store he was extremely popular with the public and his courteous manners made it a pleasure to deal with him. He will be buried from Halli church at 10 o'clock this morning. Rev S L Desha will preach the funeral sermon.

Family Name Disappears.

The last thread of hope for the perpetuation of the Crowningberg family and name was sundered this morning in the death of William Keolani Crowningberg, aged 14 years. After an illness of over two weeks, during which time he has been treated for typhoid fever, and the fever was well under way, when bronchial troubles affected him so that it finally got the best of him. He was a pupil of Iolani College, at which place he was taken ill, but his death occurred in the house of the Rev F Fitz, in St Andrew's Cathedral close. His parents are both dead and David Crowningberg, assistant road supervisor, is his granduncle. Not very long ago his grandmother, Mrs Malupo Scott, died. He has two sisters surviving him.

His funeral will take place at 4 o'clock this afternoon from St Andrew's Cathedral, interment to be at Kawaishao cemetery.
